One window extension to right with brick quoins and dressings, ground floor retains 3 light glazing bar casement. Three brick ridge chimneys. Modern glazed porch and half glazed door. Two storey extension with catslide to rear engulfing gable to 'T' section chimney.

Mid C19 2 storey brick 3 window wing with stone tile roof to rear linking with lower pantiled stable block. Formerly mansard hipped roof with dormers.

Named after a Chapel of Ease of Cricklade St Sampson's (ruins of this structure said to be incorporated in farmyard to south).

Plumbing to right voids into rainwater head dated W.S. 1765. Two bay matching extension to right with large external stack off centre right and 2 gabled dormers. Two bay return to left hand. Two storey C18 lower hipped wing joins to left and is linked by a late 2½ storey wing (probably mid C19).

Four bay nave and south aisle. Two bay chancel. C15 west tower. Present structure probably C13 in origin but had extensive restoration by Butterfield 1870. Built of rubble with stone slate roof.

Dividing buttresses to nave. Gabled ashlar porch to left with pointed doorway; a similar doorway with rounded label ends on north side of nave. A variety of windows, mostly restored; one pretty circa 1300 small geometrical tracery window to right on south side. Chancel has south aisle and gabled vestry to north. Four stage tower rendered on moulded plinth. Parapet of pierced quatrefoils probably circa 1870. Diagonal buttresses. Corbel heads to cornice, blind tracery to belfry window heads. Contemporary 4 centre arched doorway with ancient bar and carved pandrels.

Interior: low cylindrical piers with round abaci to double chamfered circa 1300 arcade.

Roofs: 2 versions of truss rafter former waggon roofs. C17 panelled 3-bay screen to tower with balustraded parapet and top cartouche. Under the tower is the John Potenger memorial (died 1733) by Peter Scheemakers, marble with cherubs.

Early C17 and later C17. 'L' plan rubble with stone tile roof. Two and a half storeys and cellar. Modern porch in angle. Ashlar chimneys with moulded capping (diagonal when in pairs). Two bays to left wing and one to right hand, glazing bar sashes. Gable ends have open pediments, or triangular labels, above windows of first and attic floors. Two gables to west, one with a pair of chimneys; stair with mid C19 window with intersecting glazing; and a number of very small windows.

Rear: 2 gables one with later brick diagonal chimneys, the other with triangular labels to sash windows and blocks to lintels and at transom (lost) level.

Interesting interior details: the staircase is square-plan Jacobean with 3 landings between floors, heavy balusters and handrails, and corner and centre pillars (corners panelled). Arcading between pillars on first floor landing. On the first floor a circa 1600 fireplace with plain panelled spandrels and rounded stop chamfer. The ground floor parlour has another circa 1600 fireplace with panelled spandrels and high stop chamfers cut back. Door to parlour and to cellar has decorative stop chamfers which look later than early C17.

House. Probably late C17 or early C18 incorporating earlier features; added to and altered C19 and C20. Rubblestone brought to course with ashlar dressings; additions have red brick dressings. Mid C19 Welsh slate roof. Original range square on plan, 2 rooms deep, of 2 storeys with attic and partial cellar and 5 x 5 bays. 2-storey wing added to rear left, early to mid C19, in 2 builds; and a single-storey C20 brick addition to left side, not of special interest. The original range has quoins, chamfered plinth and the original windows are hollow-moulded cross-windows with hoodmoulds, and relieving arches on ground floor. Entrance elevation: central door of 6 raised and fielded panels in moulded architrave with tripartite keystone and console-bracketed pediment flanked by ends of later tie-rods. Altered windows have 4-pane sashes (except for 2-pane sash to 1st floor of bay 2) in keyed plain stone surrounds (the sills lower than those of the original windows). Moulded cornice. 3 gabled dormers. Hipped roof with central valley in which rise 2 stacks.

Rear: on left a 2-light hollow-moulded stone mullioned cellar window; on ground floor a C19 2-light window to left and on right a low-level 3 light ovolo-moulded wooden-mullioned window, both having timber lintels; on right a C19 round-arched stair window, having 4-pane sash and fanlight with intersecting glazing bars; right bay masked by wing addition, but old attic window with hoodmould is visible.

Right return: to right of centre a 2-light hollow-moulded stone-mullioned cellar window; two ground-floor windows, that on right a later 3-light, timber-lintelled, window, that on left and the 4 above all original, except for 4-pane sash to first floor of right bay; windows of bay 1 blind, and that on ground floor with date "1767" incised on left jamb; one gabled dormer; Left return; original windows, those of two right bays blind, the mullions and transoms removed from 2 left-hand windows on 1st floor; one gabled dormer. On left, wing has brick quoins and brick surrounds to segmental arched openings; 3-light window and board door to left-hand section (former cheese room) two 3-light windows and board door with 2-light window above to right-hand section; roof hipped at left end and with stack between sections.

Interior: cellar windows have iron stanchions and wooden lintels; on ground floor, rear right room has large-scantling chamfered beams with stapped cyma stops, and the lintel partly replaced in concrete and then original lintel said to have been dated "1660" on right corner; on first floor, rear left room has another moulded Tudor-arched fireplace; some old doors. Dog-leg stair has wave-moulded soffits to treads, pilastered and cornice dado; balustrade removed. Old floor boards in attic. Roof has old principal rafters, collars, and staggered butt purlins, but rafters replaced.

Former coach-house, probably early C19 altered. Rubblestone with red-brick dressings and some blue headers. Partially roofed in corrugated iron, but mostly collapsed. One storey, formerly with loft, with 2nd storey at centre. 5-bay symmetrical elevation, arranged 2:1:2. Brick-quoined angles and surrounds to openings. (Central carriage entrance has round-cornered flat brick arch with ashlar imposts and keystone and C20 sliding door; keyed oculus above and stepped gable with coping stones; segmental-arched windows flank centre with doorways beyond, all having keystones and in left doorway the remains of a board stable door. Rear: former opening to right bay, the walling of this section collapsed. Returns: each has an inserted ground floor opening and an original, keyed, segmental-arched loading hatch to gable. Interior: cobblestone floors. Upper floor of central bay lined with bird nesting holes. In state of dereliction at time of inspection.

House, formerly Farmhouse. c1697. Rubble walls, red brick quoins and dressings, rendered to front, generally colourwashed. Artificial stone slate roof, brick stacks. Original building of 2-room plan, entered via lobby behind right-hand gable stack, stair to front of stack, but main door originally to centre of front elevation. Extended by 1 room to right, and by 2 gabled blocks to rear, in C19. 2½ storeys. 2 + 1 bays to front, those to the left having sashes with glazing bars. Central door blocked, now a window; door to right of centre, in place of window, entered via porch. At right hand end of C17 block, two small oak framed windows with chamfered mullions, formerly lighting stair, 2 lights to ground floor, and one to first floor. Altered casement windows to C19 right hand bay. Two gabled dormers, 3 chimneys, those to left C17, the upper courses rebuilt C20. Open fireplace to left-hand ground floor room has ornamented stone fire-back date 1697, reset but probably primary to the house. An interesting example of the transition from C17 lobby entry to C18 central stair plans, the facade being made symmetrical save for the small windows lighting the stair.

(SBC Note: In 1984, repair work revealed the two C17 windows referred to above. The description was amended as a result. The datestone referred to actually appears to read 1769).

Medieval traces. Practically rebuilt by Butterfield 1868. Small country church of rubble with red tile roof. C15 style grafted on early English. Chancel, nave and south aisle, west bell turret with 2 bells and odd spirelet. Three bay nave with central gabled porch to north with quatrefoil vent and trefoil heads to side buttresses. Hollow chamfered surround to pointed doorway (possibly C13), wrought iron strap hinges. A2 and a 3-light square headed Perpendicular style window with mouchette heads. Plain ashlar dressed paired lights to lower later 2 bay chancel with gabled organ vestry to north. Three light geometrical east window (with, inside, a foiled 'rere-arch' - in fact foiled reveal). The west front appears to be a different build: rough-faced rubble with ashlar bands. Central belfry break with 2 foiled openings and crenellated parapet to hipped roof; small octagonal spirelet and weathervane; this break is linked by wall thickening and buttress to small door to south-west with Caernarvon arch. Foiled vesca-shape opening to right. Boiler house and chimney to south-west. Interior: reused plain circa 1200 doorway (now a niche). Low 3 bay arcade, C13. Butterfield reredos, altar-rails, sedilia and pews retained. Nave roof: king post type with foiled braces. Rubble churchyard wall to south and to west, gabled doorway formerly entrance from Abbey. Numerous medieval fragments - sculpted stones, medieval tiles and some traces of an arcade found during work of 1868, indicating a later church in the Middle Ages.

Small squared rubble with ashlar quoins and chamfered dressings, half hipped stone tile roof. Also, apparently, a dovecote.
