Probably circa 1797 and after. Two storeys (formerly 3 as result of Victorian enlargement). Country villa reduced from Victorian castellated mansion and extended in Georgian style 1965 (see rainwater heads). Ashlar with a band over ground floor and chamfered quoins. Parapet and moulded coping. Centre balustraded with flanking urns. Concealed slate roof. East front: 3 bays with slight centre break and glazing bar sash windows. Centre first floor window has moulded architrave, ground floor side windows have moulded architraves and cornices. Central solid portico with tripartite pillar arrangement and glazed doorway (replaces ionic portico in antis now on north front). North front retains 2 storey bow with balustraded parapet to left. This has been repeated (1965) to the right with a 3 bay section between which has 4 column ionic portico in antis (from garden front). Rainwater heads marked B (for Barker) 1965. Architect: Tom Bird. Interior a very pleasant Georgian pastiche with oval top-lit stair hall. South-east room retains original decoration.

Probably C18, altered. Rubble pair. One and a half and two storeys. Stone tile roof with gable and brick chimneys. Two ranges of 2 light casements, first floor of No 6 half dormered, glazing bars. Central doors lean-to to right. 'T'-plan to rear. Included for value to village scene.

Mill Lane said to have led to the Castle Mill, as the site of the old castle from which the village takes its name may have been in this area.

After 1806. Altered mid-C19. Two storeys rubble with slate roofs and 3 brick chimneys. Three+two bays (end 2 taller), glazing bar sash windows, left hand windows on first floor have brick quoins, on ground floor cambered arches (except to right which retains short flat arch of circa 1800). Right hand bay to right in angled bay Gabled porch to glazed door. 'T'-plan extension to rear with 2 bays of 3 light casements, probably C18.

Late C18 or early C19. Cotswold rubble barn with stone tile roof. Double stable entry in centre to west. The Manor Farm building group has been much reduced recently.

Mostly C13 and Butterfield. (Restoration 1861-3, principally to roof). Rubble with stone tile roof. Two stage crenellated west tower. Four bay nave with gable C15 south porch. Three bay late C13 chancel. Odd corbelled belfry over crossing with spire and weathervane. Nave has an early C14 window and 2 restored geometric-type windows. Chancel windows plain with slight cusping. Projecting gabled vestry to north-east (1860s) with small 2-light cellar or damp proof windows and reticulated window to the east. Porch has diagonal buttresses and a niche over, south door late Norman with 2 slightly carved caps to nook shafts, chevron and roll label with pellets and dragon head stops. Tower C15 with high stepped and twice moulded plinth and diagonal outer buttresses. Two light belfry windows, foiled with square heads and drips. Pointed west door with Perpendicular period window above. North side has cat-slide roof and plain Norman arched north door. Inside porch is a large effigy slab of a knight - probably mid C14 for brass. Interior: north arcade removed and replaced by timber posts, wall painting of Virgin on east chamfered respond. Good Jacobean pulpit incorporating part of a C15 screen. A number of memorials in tower chamber, the best to Walter Parker, died 1664 - a swagged oval with 2 putti supporting arms. Numerous C18 and C19 tombstones in graveyard to south, several with carved angel heads, 2 chest tombs of early C19 and one moulded unscrolled top of a baletomb (to south of the church).

C18. Ashlar and coursed and dressed rubble, eaves raised. Stone tile roof. Two storeys, 5 windows, French casements on ground floor, 2 light chamfered mullion windows on first floor. Doorway with moulded stone architrave and cornice, glazed door. Five bay cast iron verandah in front with tiled floor.

Good example of an early C18 house. Two and a half storeys red and blue brick with ashlar quoins and rubble plinth. Three course band over ground floor. Hipped stone tile roof with 2 large brick chimneys. Three hipped dormers to front and one to each hip. Three windows, glazing bar sashes with segmental heads. Doorway replaced by matching window to left and lower door to right. Extension to south-west has monolithic oval window. Small rubble building to north-east: rubble with stone tile roof, 2 wide modern doors and central small lean-to for garage to left. Possibly rebuilt circa 1720 when the former Green Dragon became the Red Lion.

Probably C17. One and a half storeys rubble with stone tile roof (modern tiles to rear). Three brick chimneys, one with stone base and moulded plinth. Four gables for attic windows, altered 2 light casements. Three 3 light cavetto-moulded mullion windows on ground floor with drips. Two half glazed doors with wooden lintels.

Probably C18. Two storeys rubble with rough dressed quoins. Stone slate roof with 3 brick chimneys; moulded plinths. Irregular 3-light casement windows with wooden lintels, 4 on first floor, 3 on ground floor, 2 ledged doors, No 3 has panel over blocked door to left, possibly once a datestone.

C18 altered. Low 2 storey cottage built of rubble with stone tile roof. No chimney visible from front. Wooden lintels. Two 3-light casements on first floor. Three windows on ground floor, central one replacing door. Door now in gabled porch to left return. Included mainly for group value.

Early C19, 2½ storey pair. Coursed and dressed rubble with ashlar quoins and dressings. Slate roof with 2 brick chimneys. Three gabled 2 light dormers with metal glazing bars. Three windows, glazing bar sashes. Two modern gabled porches, left hand one with 9 panel double doors, right hand one with 6 panel door. 'L' plan extension to rear with stone tile roof and very large bread ovens (former bakery). Stone in drive to west said to be base of second church cross.

Greenaways

Said to be C17. Probably circa 1720. Two storeys, rubble with stone tile roof of steep pitch. Gable end chimney to right. One range of modern 3 light casements (formerly with mullions) and an inserted window to left. Modern gabled porch. Gable extension to right. Single storey extension to left. Blocked gable light well in front. Inglenook fireplace inside. Main beam has decorated stop chamfer similar to that at Lower Farmhouse, Wick Road, Hannington (qv).

Cottage to west of Greenaways

Circa 1700. Two and a half storeys, rubble with bands of dressed ashlar. Bradstone tile roof with 2 brick chimneys and a gabled dormer. Two+one bays, wooden lintels to modern cross casements. First floor of later right hand bay blind. Door central to main part, 4 flush panels and weatherhood. Slightly set back brick extension to left. (*TBC note: This cottage is known as Shep Cottage*) .

C18. 'L' plan. One and a half storeys rubble with stone tile roof. One chimney (modern). Gable to right with one 3 light casement to attic and 2 windows on ground floor. Modern leaded casements among others. Entered from rear. Interior contains older features.

Circa 1820s front to very much older building. Two and a half storeys. Coursed and dressed rubble with ashlar dressings and stone tile roof with coped verges. Gable end brick chimneys with chamfered capping to plinths. Central dormer with scalloped bargeboard. Three windows, glazing bar sashes, balconettes to first floor. Central 6 panel door with rectangular overlights. Box-like wrought-iron porch (possibly C20). Rear older, 1½ storey extension. Little shed in wall to west close to Castle East farm buildings, stone tiled roof. Interior retains features to early C17 date and traces of subsequent alterations.

Early C18, altered later C18. Two storeys, rubble with ashlar quoins and dressings. Hipped stone tile roof with 2 stone chimneys with moulded plinths on ridge. Two+one windows, glazing bar sashes. Tented trellis porch to right of centre, 6 flush panel door with radiating fanlight. North-east front rubbly with cill, lintel and former transom courses, 3 bays (4 windows ground floor), attic. One and a half storey brick, stone and stone tiled range to right with 4 gabled dormers. 'U'-plan to rear: one gable to right with blocked 2 light mullion window and drip. Central 3-light chamfered mullion window and drip. Left hand wing of 2 bays, angle filled by brick stair turret on stone plinth, cross type wooden frame windows. Long lower 2 storey rubble and brick stable range to left. Pleasant farmyard grouping.

C18. Rubble with ashlar long and short quoins. Stone tile roof with raised and moulded verges and moulded footstones. Corrugated iron roofed midstrete to right of centre, flanking cat-slide with raised and moulded verges. Roof trusses modern.

K6 Telephone Kiosk (no. 025851 396)

Telephone kiosk. Type K6. Designed 1935 by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott. Made by various contractors. Cast iron. Square kiosk with domed roof. Unperforated crowns to top panels and margin glazing to windows and door.
